


Over the next few weeks we would like you to produce as many different marks, textures, patterns as you can with just a piece of corrugated card and black acrylic paint.

There are some fantastic documentaries and film out there at the moment. Immerse yourself in art, here's a few suggestions, but this is not an exhaustive list, in fact I just ran out of space.

Anything by the art critic Alistair Sooke or James Fox (don't get him confused with James Fox the actor)!

"Exit through the Gift Shop", Directed by Banksy, it tells the story of Thierry Guetta, a French immigrant in Los Angeles, and his obsession with street art.

"Mr Turner," a 2014 biographical drama film based on the last 25 years of the life of artist J. M. W. Turner (1775–1851).

A glimpse into the obsessive mindset of an artist.


"David Hockney—A Bigger Picture," a documentary which follows the artist around the Yorkshire Wolds (see if you can recognise any places). Hockney is probably the greatest living British artist.

"Jean Michel Basquiat - The Radiant Child," The Radiant Child is based around a rare interview that director and friend Tamra Davis shot with Basquiat. There's also another film about Basquiat, called ... "Basquiat"! Produced by Julian Schnabel's in 1996, a biopic of the artists life. More importantly in the film the artist Andy Warhol is played by the god, that is David Bowie.

All of these films can be streamed through various online platforms. The documentaries can be screened through 'Vimeo'.




Choose one simple geometric or organic shape. Draw anything you wish but only use that shape.


